

Guidance on registrations



### What is CHARD?

- The Cultural Heritage At Risk Database (CHARD) is a non-profit NGO based between the Netherlands and the UK
- It was initiated as a pro-bono project in 2015 of the Art Loss Register (ALR). Founded in 1990, the ALR is the central due diligence database for the international art market, carrying out 450,000 checks each year
- Alongside the registration of lost and stolen objects, CHARD specifically supports the prevention of illicit trafficking and sale of cultural property, primarily in the event of conflict and natural disaster, and to protect objects that remain in situ but at significant risk

### What is CHARD?

- CHARD works directly with governments and law enforcement, as well as non governmental organisations, heritage agencies, archaeologists, archivists and individuals to register 'at risk' objects.
- The ALR database provides the database infrastructure for CHARD, since it is the well established due diligence mechanism for checks on the international art market
- No third party has access to CHARD or the ALR database to be able to view registered objects, so traffickers cannot first check whether an object is registered and avoid detection in an attempted transfer or sale elsewhere
- If a registered item is identified in the ALR's 450,000 annual checks of public and private sales, local and international law enforcement will be informed

## What can be registered on CHARD?

#### *Types of case:*

- Stolen or missing items from archaeological sites, museums, warehouses, storage etc. that are the cultural property of a museum or nation state
- Collections in museums, sites, libraries, archives, depositories or storage where they may be 'at risk' of looting

#### Types of item:

- Antiquities
- Architectural fittings
- Arms and armour
- Books and manuscripts

- Ceramics
- Coins and medals
- Musical, scientific and mechanical instruments
- Metalwork and jewellery

- Paintings and drawings, prints, photographs, etc.
- Religious items
- Sculpture
- Silverware

- Image
- Description of the object ('culture'/material/dimensions/markings)
- Ideally:
  - Details of its original site, excavation, depository, museum etc..
  - Details of its loss (date, location, relevant reference numbers)
  - Any documentation, publication etc.
- To be sent to CHARD in whatever format easiest for you ideally the template spreadsheet, or in some other form
- CHARD understands that much of this data may not be available for every item

- Describing the objects:
  - How might it be described on the market, as well as in a museum?
  - Additional (vs. exclusive) keywords, e.g. an object might be Roman and Hellenistic; sword and dagger
- Ideally objects in the same collection (e.g. an inventory of a specific site) or the same loss sent through together
- Green categories are vital, yellow are very helpful but not mandatory

- CHARD understands that much of this data may not be available for every item
- CHARD is very happy to review what images and details of objects are available –
  and in what format (e.g. spreadsheet or catalogue) and can then advise if
  further information might be required to complete the registration process.
- If anyone is concerned for their own safety as a result of providing information to CHARD for registration, then they should let CHARD know and items can be added anonymously.

# Strengthening registrations

- Any further details such as inventories, publications, photographs and so on that may be available to show the object with a museum, site or depository should be held onto as this could be important evidence to demonstrate the rightful ownership in future.
- Through CHARD, the ALR is able to hold electronic copies of these to ensure that they are not lost in the passage of time or other reasons, and so that they a immediately available when a stolen item appears o the market.








## Use of data provided to CHARD

- Any information provided to CHARD will be used solely for the purpose of locating these objects if they are offered on the market and then informing the relevant authorities
- Only CHARD and ALR staff have access to the database itself and thus only they can see the items that have been registered upon it
- CHARD and the ALR recognises the enormous amount of work that academics and institutions put into creating databases, inventories and research and will not publish the information provided to it more widely
- The information provided will remain confidential to CHARD and the ALR unless and until it needs to be provided to law enforcement or others in the event an item is located.
